

ROSAC Case Study #1

Jake, Jane, and Jimmy

Overview

Jake, age 39, began dating Jane, age 32, two months ago. Jane has an 11-year-old son, Jimmy. They all started living together two weeks ago. Neighbors saw that Jake is on the sex offender registry, and they reported to the police and Child Protective Services (CPS) their concern that a “registered sex offender” is living with a child.

Referral Question

CPS is investigating the case to determine whether Jake poses a risk of sexual abuse to Jimmy. What type of contact should Jake be allowed to have with Jimmy?

Background

Abuser Considerations. Four years ago, Jake maxed out a 10-year prison sentence for sexually fondling a 12-year-old boy approximately 12 times over the course of four months. He has two prior convictions for molesting boys. When he was age 14, he molested a 10-year-old cousin. When he was age 21, he molested three 11- to 13-year-old boys while he was working at a camp. All of these sex offenses involved Jake verbally manipulating the boys to engage in sexual fondling, mutual masturbation, and oral sex. His score on the Static-99R sex offense risk instrument is in risk level IVb, well above average risk, for sexual reoffending.

He accepts full responsibility for committing all of the sex offenses for which he has been convicted. Following his first two sex offense convictions, he completed community sex offender treatment programs. While in prison for the current sexual offense, he completed a prison-based sex offender treatment program. Because he is not under any correctional supervision, there is no current requirement for him to be in any type of treatment.

Except for his sex offenses, he has no other criminal history. He was on probation for his earlier sexual offense when he committed the index sexual offense. His residence and employment have been stable the past few years. He has no substance abuse or mental health problems. He has never lived with an adult lover for more than a few months. He was cooperative with the CPS interview.

Child at Risk Considerations. Jimmy is age 11. An older neighbor boy sexually abused him on three occasions a few years ago. Jimmy told his mom about the abuse and she reported it to authorities. Jimmy has no evident physical, cognitive, or emotional disabilities. When interviewed by a CPS social worker, Jimmy said Jake has been nice to him but has not spent much time with him.

Primary Caregiver Considerations. Jane (Jimmy’s mom) was cooperative with the CPS investigation. She said she is aware of Jake’s sexual offending history and was able to describe it in detail. She says however that since he has completed sex offender treatment, he no longer poses a risk to children. She has a prosocial support system composed of several long-term friends who do not get in trouble with the law or abuse alcohol or drugs. She is full-time employed as a bookkeeper. She does not have any substance abuse, mental health, or physical health problems. She appears to be an attentive to her son, provides a stable home life, and supports his involvement in after school extra-curricular activities.

ROSAC Case Study #2

Don, Darcy, David, and Daryl

Overview

Don is 34 years old. When he was age 28, he sexually assaulted a 15-year-old female who used to baby-sit his two boys. His boys, David and Daryl, are now ages 12 and 14. He is about to be released from prison after serving five years of a 10-year sentence. He was eligible for early release because he successfully completed the prison sex offender treatment program. He and his wife Darcy, age 34, have been married for 15 years. Don continued to live in his home with his wife and two boys after he was first charged for the index sex offense.

Referral Question

Don wants to return to live with his wife and two boys upon his release from prison. Because Don is a convicted “sex offender,” his probation officer and the local Child Protective Services (CPS) office are collaborating to decide whether Don will pose a risk of sexual abuse to his two boys. What type of contact should Don be allowed to have with his sons David and Daryl?

Background

Abuser Considerations. Don has committed one sex offense. When he was age 28, he sexually assaulted a 15-year-old female on one occasion. She was a neighbor who has since moved away. After having drunk about 6 beers one evening, he went to her home, found her alone, and physically forced her to engage in sexual intercourse. He gained her cooperation by threatening her with physical violence if she did not agree to have sex with him. She cooperated and did not sustain any physical injuries.

He successfully completed the prison portion of his recommended sex offender treatment program and has agreed to enter the community aftercare portion of his recommended sex offender treatment upon his release from prison. He has been cooperative with prison treatment and casework staff, and he has been cooperative with release planning activities. He continues to blame alcohol, at least in part, for his sexual offense. His score on the Static-99R sex offense risk instrument is in risk level II, below average risk, for sexual reoffending.

He has one prior criminal conviction for domestic violence against his wife when he was age 20. He was abusing alcohol at the time. He was sentenced to and successfully completed a 3-year term of probation. He and his wife have generally got along reasonably well since that time, except for a brief separation when she asked him to move out of the home for a month after his arrest for the index sex offense. He said he has not used any alcohol or drugs since his arrest for the index sex offense. It took eight months from the date of his arrest to his incarceration.

He and his wife have lived in the same home for the past 8 years. He has worked for the same auto-body shop since he graduated from high school and has been promised his old job back when he is released from prison. He and his wife were in marital therapy briefly several years ago concerning his alcohol abuse. He has no history of major mental health problems.

Child at Risk Considerations. His two boys are now ages 12 and 14. They visited him every few months while he was in prison, feel very attached to their dad, and want him to come home and live with them again. They do not like it when their parents argued, which was infrequent and always when their dad was using alcohol. There is no indication that they have ever been victims of sexual, emotional, or physical abuse, although they were quite upset about their father’s sexual offense and its impact on the family.

Primary Caregiver Considerations. His wife Darcy wants Don to live with the family again. She does not have a good working relationship with Don’s probation officer. She has attended requested pre-release meetings but has been rather defensive and argumentative in interviews with him. She is fully aware of the details of Don’s sexual offense, believes he committed the offense, knows his risk factors for future sexual assault against females (e.g., alcohol abuse), and argues that he poses no risk to sexually abuse their two boys. She said if he ever did anything to hurt her boys she would kick Don out of the house. She has no history of mental health or substance abuse problems. She has been a stable and good provider and protector of their two boys while Don has been in prison. She has the support of her two prosocial parents who live nearby and several prosocial friends.

ROSAC Case Study #3

Paul, Penny, and Peter

Overview

Paul, age 37, recently plead guilty to possessing child pornography (CP) and is about to be sentenced. The plea agreement is for Paul to receive probation. He is now undergoing a court ordered presentence investigation and psychosexual evaluation. His wife Penny is age 34 and they have a son Peter who is age 3. The court allowed Peter to continue to live with his wife and son after his arrest.

Referral Question

If Paul is placed on probation, what type of contact should Paul be allowed to have with his son Peter?

Background

Abuser Considerations. About eight months ago, the Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force raided Paul's home and arrested him for possessing CP. Analysis of his computer found approximately 60 videos focused on adult heterosexual content and 40 child sexual exploitation videos, approximately 95% of which were focused on females ages approximately 10 to 13 engaged in solo sexual activities and sexual activities with teenage and adult males. The child sexual exploitation videos were downloaded over seven occasions over the course of about 14 months. He says that while downloading adult pornographic movies he saw that some of the videos were of female children, became curious and sexually aroused, and continued to look at them over about 12 months. During this time, he also purposely downloaded more videos of females approximately 10 to 13 years old about six other times. He is judged to have been open and cooperative with staff conducting the presentence investigation and psychosexual evaluation. His score on the Child Pornography Offender Risk Tool (CPORT) is in the low range. A sexual interest assessment indicates that his primary sexual interests are towards adult females and that he evidences lesser, but significant sexual interest in pubescent females.

Paul and Penny have lived together in the same apartment for eight years and married for five years. They report having a relatively good sexual relationship. Previously, Paul had two other live-in relationships with adult women. Except for the current sex offense, Paul has no other criminal history and no history of substance abuse problems. He is employed full time as a store clerk. He said he has suffered mild bouts of depression recently and over the years, and he thinks this may have contributed to his use of child sexual exploitation materials and other pornography as a coping mechanism.

Child at Risk Considerations. Peter appears to be a healthy and happy 3-year-old boy. He has met appropriate developmental milestones. There are no indications that Paul, Penny, or anyone else has abused Peter sexually or otherwise. Due to Peter's young age, interviewing him was not undertaken. Peter appears to be closely bonded to his parents.

Primary Caregiver Considerations. Penny has been cooperative with staff conducting the presentence investigation and psychosexual evaluation. She said she is very angry with her husband for using adult and child pornography but still loves him and has not asked him to move out of the home. They are communicating about and working through these problems. Penny works part-time as a store clerk. She is judged to be a responsible parent and has a good caregiver history. She has a positive support network of family and friends that she sees frequently. She has talked to all of them about Paul's arrest and behavior. Following Paul's arrest, Penny said that she has been more aware of Paul's interactions with their son Peter. However, she has not seen anything that concerns her and does not believe that Paul would sexually abuse Peter.

ROSAC Case Study #4

Bill, Betty, Bonnie, and Barry

Overview

Bill, age 40, sexually abused his daughter Bonnie when she was age 11. She is now 14 years old. He served two years in prison for these sex offenses. He has been out of prison for three months and his wife Betty (age 39), daughter Bonnie (age 14), and son Barry (age 16) all want him to move back home. Bill has not seen his son or daughter in over 2 years.

Referral Question

Bill's probation officer and Bonnie's therapist, CPS case worker, and victim advocate are collaborating to decide if it is safe and in Bonnie's best interests for Bill to reintegrate into the family. What are your recommendations?

Background

Abuser Considerations. Bill sexually fondled and kissed his daughter Bonnie's breasts three times over a three-week period when she was age 11. She is now 14 years old. He committed these sex offenses when he would go into her bedroom at bedtime to say good night. Bill had been drinking at the time of all the offenses. He would stop touching her soon after he began to fondle her and she told him to stop.

Her served a 2-year prison sentence following his convictions for these sex offenses. The prison did not have a sex offender program for which he was eligible, but he did complete the prison-based substance abuse program. Bill's score on the Static-99R sex offense risk instrument is in risk level I, very low risk, for sexual reoffending.

He is now in a community-based sex offender treatment program. He has been actively participating in treatment and says he will do whatever he needs to do to get back with his family. He has been cooperative with treatment and probation expectations. He admits committing the sex offenses. He said his drinking was clearly a contributor to his sexual offending, but it was not the cause of his offending. He said he had been having sexual thoughts about his daughter since she began entering puberty but only acted upon those thoughts when he had been drinking.

In addition to the index sexual offenses, he was convicted of Driving While Intoxicated (DWI) when he was age 31. He successfully completed probation and alcohol treatment related to this DWI conviction. He has no other criminal history. He has had episodic brief periods of problem drinking during the last 12 years, which has caused some marital discord over their 20-year marriage. His longest period of sobriety during this time was three years. He has not used any alcohol since his release from prison and says he is committed to sobriety.

He dated females his own age throughout his teenage years and married his wife when he was 20. They both report that their sexual relationship has been generally good throughout the marriage. They own a home where they have lived for over six years. He agreed to move out of the home after being charged for the index sex offense. Upon release from prison, he got his old job back as a baker at a bakery where he has worked since he was age 24. He has no major mental health problems.

Child at Risk Considerations. Bonnie told a friend about the abuse, and she reported it to the authorities. Bonnie initially felt blamed by her mom and brother for breaking up the family, but through individual and family counseling now feels very supported by them. Bonnie and her brother Barry both want their dad to move back home. Other than the index sex offenses, there is no indication that she has been the victim of other abuse in the past or that she has any physical, cognitive, or emotional disabilities.

Primary Caregiver Considerations. Betty initially blamed her daughter for the abuse, but soon turned her anger towards her husband and began supporting Bonnie. She wants to give her marriage a fresh start but does not know if she can ever fully trust her husband again. There is no indication that she knew about the sexual abuse before Bonnie reported the abuse. Betty has been a good caregiver to both of her children. Bill has told Betty all of the details of the abuse. She has met with Bill and his probation officer, and she has been cooperative in these meetings. As well, she has been active and supportive in attending family counseling with Bonnie and Barry. She works as a nurse's aid and has a prosocial support network of close friends. She does not have any mental health substance abuse, or physical health problems.
